Predicted Grade Examination



- When
 - Monday 19th June Thursday 29th June
- Why
 - An accurate view of each student's progress
 - Learning the process (A levels are terminal exams)
 - To provide the most accurate information from which teacher will make a judgement about the students' predicted grades
- What if...
 - The deadline for applications is in January.
 - October Assessments will provide evidence for Revised Predicted Grades.

Predicted Grade Guidance



A predicted grade is the grade of qualification an applicant's school or college believes they're likely to achieve in positive circumstances.

The Principles

- ✓ aspirational but achievable stretching predicted grades can be motivational for students
- ✓ determined by <u>professional</u> judgement
- ✓ data-driven

Predicted Grades should not be:

- affected by student, parental, guardian, or carer <u>pressure</u>
- influenced by university or college <u>entry requirements</u> or behaviours
- affected by student behaviour or background predicted grades should be made <u>objectively</u> and disregard external factors.



Registering for an account

Once you've registered, we ask you a few questions like when you want to start studying, where you live and what you're interested in so we can tailor the information you see.


Make sure you choose the correct study year, **2024** if you want to start next year, including if you want to defer entry.



Security marking: **PUBLIC** | 12

There is a maximum of 5 choices and choice restrictions still apply (a maximum of four courses of medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine or veterinary science).

Once all choices are added you must mark the section as complete to be able to submit.



You can add up to 5 choices to your application. You can change your choices until you send your application to us. All sections must be marked as complete before you can send your application to us.


Mark complete

Application overview

Your 'Application status' helps you keep track of your progress.

As you add information to each tile, the **percentage complete** updates each time you mark a section as complete.

You don't need to complete the application straight away, you can log in and out at any time until you're finished.



Is it that hard?

<u>No.</u>

Anyone can write a first draft selling themselves in about an hour. (It might be a 'bad' first draft but it's a draft... just get something done.)

What do you write?

- Why you want to study the course / job. (If you can't explain why, consider changing your course choice.)
- What experiences you have had that will show why you are a good fit for the course / job. (If you can't find any, consider changing your course choice.)
- Wider reading that shows you are passionate about your subject / job area. (If you haven't done any... well, you get the general idea.)
- Use the structure given by the school. It's available on the '2022 Starters' Google Classroom. You will have a session on this in the summer. (Early entry need to start now!)

What if you haven't decided what to apply for?

Write one for each area... The best one is probably the best area to apply for!

How do you write it?

- Use Google Drive.
- Please write formally.
- Think about your punctuation, vocabulary and variety of sentences. (Think about it like a Transactional Writing Task from GCSE: it's sort of persuasive writing)
- Think about your accuracy. Proof read BEFORE asking anyone else to look at it otherwise you're wasting their time.


What do you do once you have written your first draft?

- Share with your your tutor.
- Think about people who you know out of school who are experts in the area you're applying for.
- Perhaps share with the teacher who teaches the subject you wish to pursue.
- Mr Lloyd and Mr White can help but don't assume we have to.
- The earlier you write it, the more time people will have to support you with it!

Some final advice...

- Start early
- Make use of the resources : UCAS website/Student Room
- Plan out the structure with bullet points and headings, then turn these into full sentences and paragraphs
- Draft in Microsoft Word, spell checking AND proof reading it before you paste it into UCAS
- Keep a copy in case you are called to interview
- DON'T plagiarise

Steps in the Autumn Term

- Decide roughly when you want to make your application by:
- Early entry by October 16th.
- Everyone else by January 15th but our experience does suggest it's good to start early.
- BOOK A SLOT WITH YOUR TUTOR for submitting your personal statement and, therefore, for requesting your reference.
- Let's talk about references.

Final steps...

Admin check with tutor (can be done around the time of asking for reference or before.)

Once overall reference is ready, you have an appointment with a member of the Sixth Form Team to go over / finalise your reference; add your predicted grades and ONLY THEN does everything go to UCAS. You literally press the button.

Now just focus on achieving the best grades possible!!

We'll talk about replying to offers / firm & insurance / clearing and adjustment during Year 13.

When finished, add it to UCAS Form and make sure to tell your Tutor.

- UCAS announced that there would be changes to the way the personal statements but currently no changes have been made...
 - Students will receive small group masterclasses on how to write an effective personal statement (June 23)
 - Students will receive feedback on their drafts from their form tutor
 - Subject teachers are also able to offer additional support
- Conservatoire (music) and Early Entry students must have a very polished draft completed by the end of the summer holidays
 - For all other students we still highly recommend that you aim for the same deadline
- You write one personal statement for UCAS even if your course options are not identical
 - We would advise contacting individual Universities if this is the case



Pay & Send

Once Choices & Personal Statements are <u>finalised</u> you have to Pay & Send.

Your form will then be sent to the Sixth Form and your Tutor will start to work on your reference.

Your form can be returned to you for changes if required. Please ask someone in the Sixth Form Office.

Deadline October ½ term

- ✓ IMPORTANT: Tutors cannot start writing your reference until students have completed their personal statement AND hit pay and send
- ✓ Pay and Send costs £27.50

- ✓ It is worth mentioning that UCAS have announced a change to how teacher references are to be completed
 - We are fully aware of the changes and they simply reflect what we have already been doing



2 UCAS Meetings

Meet with your Tutor to discuss your application to help them write a good reference for you.

When reference is ready, your name will appear on the board in the common room.

Schedule your UCAS meeting with your assigned teacher (one of the Sixth Form Team).

You will go through the reference, predicted grades & submit application.

- ✓ Your UCAS meeting will be conducted with a senior member of the Sixth Form Team.
- ✓ You must stick to the deadlines outlined on the next slide to ensure that we have enough time to schedule each meeting

Apprenticeships overview



What is an Apprenticeship?



- An apprenticeship is a real job, with hands-on experience, a salary and the training while you work.
- You're treated just like all the other employees, with a contract of employment and holiday leave.
- You get paid and train at the same time, with at least 20% of your time spent in off the job training, often at a college, university or with a training provider.
- You train to be fully competent in your chosen occupation some offer a career path to higher qualifications - with lots of future potential for you
- Your apprenticeship can take between one and six years to complete, depending on which apprenticeship you choose, what level it's at, and your previous experience.

The A-Z of apprenticeships



Applying



- Apprenticeships are competitive to get, and each has its own entry requirements.
- Most require that you have at least a grade 4 in Maths and English GCSE.
- Degree apprenticeships usually require A Levels or equivalent level 3 qualifications.
- Employers will also want to know that you are keen to learn, have a positive attitude, can get on well with your colleagues and have excellent attendance and time keeping.
- They will usually check these things by taking a character reference from school or your employer if you have a job already.
- Volunteering and extracurricular activities are other ways to demonstrate your potential.



"Applying for an apprenticeship is like applying for a course at college. I enrol to the apprenticeship programme and they provide me with the work placement, easy and simple."

False- An apprenticeship is a professional vocation and you are applying for a job vacancy.

You find apprenticeship vacancies that you are interested in applying for, submit your application and await to hear if you gain an interview.

If you are successful to gain the interview and the apprenticeship, your employer will then get in touch with their relevant training provider where you can study the theory of the course.

However, some training is provided in house and you may not need to attend college; it is all dependent on the training provider.

Furthermore, you could also seek out an apprenticeship independently by contacting companies to seek whether they would be happy to take you on as an apprentice, if this is the case then the employer would need to seek out a relevant training provider.



"Apprenticeships only pay minimum wage"

False- It's also a common (and incorrect) assumption that Apprentices don't earn much and are all paid the National Minimum Wage, this isn't true.

While many employers might choose to pay their Apprentices minimum wage, unions are always negotiating higher pay rates for Apprentices, well above minimum wage.

In fact, the National Minimum Wage for Apprentices would see you earning roughly £100 per week, the average pay rate for Apprentices is £170 per week



"You do not gain relevant or worthwhile qualifications and it is not seen as good as a university degree."

False, A lot of people might think that Apprenticeships are for those that didn't choose (or couldn't get into) higher education like University, so are a step down.

For a huge amount of careers, employers will value the experience you've gained from an Apprenticeship just as much as the degree that someone gains from University.

All qualifications are relevant and are appropriate to different industries, not all are the same as not all require the same and needs different skills.

It is not that one if worth more than the other, it is all about individual personal choice and the job route that you would like engage with.



"I can apply for a degree apprenticeship through UCAS, just like applying for a studied degree at university."

False. Applications to Degree Apprenticeships are for people who are in paid employment and are initiated by the employer.

Employers are encouraged to contact the Degree Apprenticeships team to discuss individual circumstances and to be provided with the application forms

Applicants need to complete an application form which will then be then sent to the course directors for consideration.

Each Degree Apprenticeship has specific entry requirements and requires the applicant to be working in a role that would enable them to have the hands-on experience, to complement the learning process and the theoretical underpinning attained through studying the Degree course.

Apprenticeship Timeline



- ✓ Each company has their own application process
- ✓ UCAS announced that they wanted to try and streamline the application process to make it more similar to applying for Universities
 - This has not happened yet but UCAS have hugely improved their information on apprenticeships (more to come)

What should students considering an apprenticeship be doing right now:

- ✓ Research widely
- ✓ Networking
 - Futures conference, mock interviews, Future Friday's, Careers Team, friends, family...!
- ✓ Updating LinkedIn
- ✓ Fundamentally, you have to be a self starter
- ✓ Students need to start doing all of the above right away


